New coalition takes on campaigns to lower legal drinking age

The new Support 21 coalition, launched by Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD), the American Medical Association, the National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB), and the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety, is aimed at countering growing calls for lowering the national drinking age from 21 to 18. The <u>AFP</u> reported that Support 21 members said that the age-21 laws that have been in place since 1984 have helped significantly lower alcohol-related deaths and need to stay in place to continue to save lives.

Kentucky ABC reports a successful year with Compliance Checks

This month's Success Story shares the Kentucky Office of Alcoholic Beverage Control's successful year with its ongoing efforts to stop underage drinking. ABC visited a record 2,450 businesses resulting in 230 buys, a compliance rate of 91 percent. The compliance rate has risen steadily since 1998, when the percentage of businesses with no violations was less than 75 percent. The ABC recognizes the significance of collaborative efforts and shares the positive results showing the effective teamwork and dedication of enforcement agencies, education programs, community support and retailers throughout Kentucky!

Did you Know?

Georgia Court of Appeals Examines Exigency Arguments in Underage Drinking Case

In April 2007 the Court of Appeals for the State of Georgia handed down their opinion in the case of Burk v. State --- S.E.2d ----, 2007 WL 1053405 (2007). This case offers a good example how a Court, analyzing a strong set of facts and circumstances presented by the police in their case in chief, can be persuaded in a case of first impression. The Georgia Courts have now established some favorable case law for law enforcement officers when they are confronted with similar facts and circumstances.

Kentucky ABC reports a successful year with Compliance Checks

The Kentucky Office of Alcoholic Beverage Control (ABC) reports a successful year in 2007 with its ongoing efforts to stop underage drinking. ABC investigators with trained youth aged 18 to 20, have visited a record 2,450 businesses licensed to sell alcoholic beverages last year; resulting in 230 buys, a compliance rate of 91 percent. The compliance rate has risen steadily since 1998, when the percentage of businesses with no violations was less than 75 percent. For retailers found in violation-the investigator can charge the offending clerk with one of two possible criminal violations, depending on the jurisdiction. The license holder also can face administrative penalties levied by the ABC Board. Possible penalties include a substantial monetary fine, mandatory server training in alcoholic beverage laws and revocation of the business' ABC license. ABC recently released a new and improved website. Within the website, users will be able to see all that ABC is involved in from Education to Enforcement.

Worth noting is that according to an official with the Kentucky ABC "we have seen a steady increase in our compliance rate. The percentage of businesses that had no violations is now about 91% compared to less than 75% in 1998." The ABC shares credit for much of its success to a number of programs that support the prevention of underage drinking. An ABC program called Operation Zero Tolerance (OZT) has found success not only in monitoring illegal sales at retail businesses, but also during special events such as festivals, sporting events and off-campus keg parties. The office issued 813 citations during such events in 2006 and has issued 241 citations in 2007.

More specific to retailers-the ABC's program Server Training in Alcohol Regulations (S.T.A.R.) is giving the tools necessary for servers and sellers of alcohol to be in compliance, rather than only citing them when they make an illegal sale. Through the Office of Alcoholic Beverage Control's Division of Education and Development, the division offers a four-hour training seminar, that covers state laws pertaining to alcoholic beverages, use of false or fraudulent identification, effects of alcohol and potential server liability. The S.T.A.R training is available to licensees, their employees, local governmental units, schools and enforcement agencies. All of those who complete the class will receive a certification that will be valid for three years. The ABC recognizes the significance of collaborative efforts and indicates that the positive results show the effective teamwork and dedication of enforcement agencies, education programs, community support and retailers throughout Kentucky!
